

"Finding a Treasure in the Field"




The spiritual journey shared by Gerard Straub in his first book, "Sun and Moon Over Assisi" was mesmerizing! It was honest, forthright, and bluntly open about his fall from grace and his "refounding" by the grace of God when he visited Assisi some twenty years ago. I found myself wishing the book would never end as he chronicled his conversion from atheism to the Catholic Faith and on to becoming a dedicated Franciscan. Gerard's second book, "The Loneliness and Longing of St. Francis" is likewise worth a prayerful reading as the author learned from life itself how to "go from the Gospel to life, and life to the Gospel (SFO Rule, #4)". With wonderful perception Straub writes: "Even the most ordinary moments of the day are charged with mystical possibilities. To see the mystical in the ordinary, we need to pause often during the day and be attentive to what is

really happening all around us and inside us . . . St. Francis of Assisi was one of the many mystics who reached a place of wholeness that enable him to see God in all things (Gerard Straub, The Loneliness and Longing of Saint Francis, 23rd Publications, New London, CT, ©2014, p. 174-175)".

After Straub followed the call to become a Secular Franciscan, he continued using his prizewinning, filmmaking skills to bring the story of the poorest persons on the planet to the awareness of those capable of reaching out to assist them. Like St. Francis, he found in the dirty, scarred "lepers" of the world the face of Jesus! Thus his reflections about where he has found the Lord in the "poorest of the poor", the marginalized, the need, and seemingly forsaken persons ring so true for those called to live in the midst of the world's chaos and desperation. He gives his readers a blueprint for ever deepening conversion. Amidst the beauty of the story, one of the most helpful things about this journal, is the author's willingness to share his own spiritual struggles as he walks the path of daily conversion. There isn't any claim to "having arrived", but only an honest sharing of how challenging conversion can be in our everyday lives as we move forward and sometimes backward on our journey. For all of us still trying to figure out what our professed commitment to conversion as a Franciscan means, this book is a must. The practical suggestions offered by the author from his own life experiences are a treasure and it offers the reader some very positive guidelines to his or her own path to continuing conversion. This is not a book you would

want to read quickly, but rather slowly, prayerfully, reflectively savoring the depth of Straub's spiritual journey and message. Sometimes just a few carefully savored paragraphs are all one needs to reconnect with the "one thing necessary".. or is that, the only ONE who is necessary! The book is a treasure in the field!

A final sharing of sampling Straub's words read as follows: "God is here in this moment, waiting with open and outstretched arms, waiting to embrace and caress you with endless love. Kiss this moment, for in it is perfect joy and all good. Love is the symphony of life. It needs to be practice and played every day. God is the composer, Christ is the conductor, and we are the performers (Op. cit., p. 286)".

A little update from **KAREN GUNTER, OFS:** When Sandra and I go to Africa we observe each classroom to evaluate how the children are being taught and their responsiveness in class. We evaluate the school for any needed repairs. We meet with the people in charge to assess future needs. We meet formally to see where the school management is in relation to the self sustainment projects outlined on the previous visit. We also hug 350 kids at least once. Also in our visit we evaluate the needs of the poor coming to the Canossa Dispensary. We make home visits with Sister Cynthia, the nurse in charge of the dispensary. Sometimes we see patients with the Doctor or nurse to give input. We take needed supplies and equipment with us This year we are taking oxygen tubing, bandages etc. In addition we are taking about 450 Rosaries that will be given to each child for First Communion and Confirmation and to anyone who does have their rosary.

Our brother **JIM KITCHENS**, **OFS**, shares a "Franciscan moment". Recently he received a call from a French-accented priest in southern Indiana who wanted to connect to a family in Fort Wayne who had a small kitten that caught his fancy. The priest called the Fort Wayne Diocesan Chancery to locate the parish and the deacon who had been identified in the article. He called Jim to find out how he could give a "forever home" to the furry little grev creature. Jim said the occasion made him feel REAL Franciscan — besides, of course, all the other gifts of fraternity and grace that have come his way since beginning his journey to Franciscan life. How's that for a TAU moment and an opportunity to be a Servant-Deacon and a Servant-Franciscan! You go, brother!

An enthusiastic group of fraternity members met on May 1, 2016, to enjoy the scholarly reflections of Bro. William Short, OFM, in their new assembly room, the Leo Center.
